Call to Order: Chair Masters called the meeting to order at 4:06 pm.

Roll Call of Commission Members: Chair Masters, Vice-chair Eichelberger, and Commissioner Bennett are present.

Guests in Attendance: Members of the Rathdrum Historical Society in attendance are Carol Struck, Ellen Larsen and Sue Rector. Former commissioner Janna Paronto was at the meeting briefly. Staff in attendance: Connie Krueger, Liaison and Donna Phillips, Clerk.

1. **Consent Calendar**

- a. Motion to approve the special meeting minutes of the March 20, 2018 meeting by Vice-Chair Eichelberger. Seconded by Commissioner Bennett. Motion approved.

2. **Unfinished Business**

- a. Hayden History Book Volume II – Commissioner Bennett reported the following:

She has finished Garwood Wilson, the meat cutter from Hayden Lake who killed his employer in Seattle. Went to prison, got a stay of hanging three times by the Governor of Washington, with the last one being converted to life in prison. He got out after serving approximately 30 years. Lived the rest of his life in Ellensburg where he married and later passed away.

#21 – Walter Burns and #24 – Cramps Bay have been completed.

#23 – Fred Kernkamp and his wife had the first large commercial vegetable garden in the Hayden area. They had eight acres on Government Way almost across the street from the Hayden Lake School (the old brick one, built in 1936), then they had two acres on the east side of Government Way just north of the school where they raised potatoes and strawberries. Lacey's Gardens took over this spot when the Kernkamps sold and moved.

Commissioner Bennett is currently working on the Hudlows – she doesn't believe that this is easy. In 1910 there were 18 Hudlows living on the east side of Hayden Lake, which included Mom and Dad plus four of their married children and their families. The family owned and operated one of the first steamboats on the lake. A son, Russel, shot a guy dead when he beat his dog to death; and was sent up the river for manslaughter. His sister
